History National Curriculum Programmes of Study

- Understand historical concepts such as continuity and change, cause and consequence, similarity, difference and significance, and use them to make connections, draw contrasts, analyse trends, frame historically valid questions and create their own structured accounts, including written narratives and analyses.

- Learn about the Viking and Anglo-Saxon struggle for the Kingdom of England to the time of Edward the Confessor.
- Learn about Britain's settlement by Anglo-Saxons and Scots.
- Study an aspect or theme in British history that extends pupils' chronological knowledge beyond 1066.
- Gain historical perspective by placing their growing knowledge into different contexts: understanding the connections between local, regional, national and international history; between cultural, economic, military, political, religious and social history; and between short- and long-term timescales.

- To explain why the Anglo-Saxons invaded Britain.
- To explain the impact of the Anglo-Saxon invasion on Britain
- To describe why monasteries were so important to Anglo-Saxon Britain.

- To describe everyday life in Anglo-Saxon Britain.
- To describe how the Anglo-Saxons have influenced our lives today.
- To describe how the Vikings invaded England.
- To describe everyday life in Viking Britain.
- To explain why King Athelstan was a significant person.
